PROFESSIONAL CURIOSITY

1. What is 'Professional Curiosity'?

Professional curiosity is a core part of the job of any professional engaging with children, young people, adults and families.

It involves exploring and understanding what is happening within a family, or with the individual, rather than making assumptions or accepting things at face value.

2. Key Messages

- Be flexible and open-minded, not taking everything at face value
- Think the unthinkable; believe the unbelievable
- Ask 'the second question', probe behind the first information or first answers given
- Be alert to those who prevent professionals from seeing or listening to the person
- Ensure you are hearing the voice of the individual
- Take responsibility for the safeguarding role you play, however large or small, in the life of the person in front of you
 - Never be concerned about asking asking the obvious question and share concerns with colleagues and managers
